COMPLAINT

The United States alleges as a claim against the defendants:

1. This is an action to protect the interest of the United States that members and civilian employees of its Armed Forces and their dependents be not unconstitutionally discriminated against on account of race or color in the use and enjoyment of educational facilities which have been built or are being maintained and operated

with the use of funds of the United States under the provisions of P. L. 815 and P. L. 874, 81st Cong. (Chapters 13 and 19 of Title 20 U.S.C.), with the resultant detriment to their service and morale.

2. This Court has jurisdiction of this action under Sections 1343 and 1345 of Title 28, United States Code.

3. The Dougherty County Board of Education of Dougherty County, Georgia (hereinafter referred to as the Board), is an agency of the State of Georgia and is responsible, under the laws of Georgia, for the operation of public schools within the County. The principal office of the Board is located in Albany.

4. Louis A. Peacock is Chairman of the Board and Hollis Stanford, John Ventulett, Herbert Haley, Ernest H. Bond, George Joiner and J. I. Davis, Jr., are members of the Board. Each resides in Dougherty County, Georgia.

5. J. J. Cordell is Superintendent of Education of Dougherty County, Georgia, and is responsible for the administration of the public schools of the County under the general supervision of the Board. He resides in Dougherty County.

6. The City of Albany is located in Dougherty County and has a population of approximately 60,000 persons. Dougherty County has a population of approximately 75,000 persons.

7. The plaintiff maintains two National Defense installations in Dougherty County. These installations are the Marine Corps Supply Center and Turner Air Force Base.

8. The Marine Corps Supply Center is located in Dougherty County approximately 10 miles from the City of Albany. It is the principal source of supply for all types and classes of supplies (except for fuels, aeronautical material, designated ammunition and subsistence) for all Marine Corps units in the continental United States east of the Rocky Mountains and in the Atlantic - European - Mediterranean and Near East areas and also furnishes repair services for all such supplies. The plaintiff has stationed approximately 1300 of its military personnel and employed approximately 2100 civilians at the Center.

9. Turner Air Force Base is located in Dougherty County approximately four miles from the City of Albany. It is a Strategic Air Command Station and the base of the 4138th Strategic Wing. It is also the headquarters of the 822nd Air Division of the Eighth Air Force, a command that monitors the combat capabilities of the 4138th Strategic Wing; the 4135th Strategic Wing, Eglin Air Force Base, Florida; the 4241st Strategic Wing, Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, North Carolina; and the 4137th Strategic Wing, Robins Air Force Base, Georgia. The 4138th Strategic Wing, whose mission is to be prepared to conduct global strategic air operations on an instantaneous basis, has operating responsibility over several assigned units, among which are the 4138th Combat Support Group, the 822d Medical Group, the 62nd Aviation Depot Squadron, the 336th Bombardment Squadron, Heavy, and the 919th Air Refueling Squadron. Among

other units assigned to Turner Air Force Base are the 1370th Photo Mapping Wing, which has the sole responsibility for the Air Force's aerial mapping photography and electronic surveying, the 2023rd Airways and Air Communication System Detachment, the 8-8 Weather Group Detachment, the 305th Field Training Detachment, the 12th Radar Bomb Scoring Detachment, the Resident Auditor General and two units of the United States Army, the 2nd Missile Battalion and the 3rd Guided Missile Field Maintenance Squadron. The plaintiff has stationed approximately 5,600 military personnel and employed approximately 350 civilians at Turner Air Force Base.

10. The plaintiff has constructed and assisted in the construction of approximately 271 family housing units located on the Marine Corps Supply Center and 730 family housing units located on Turner Air Force Base. An additional 170 family housing units will be completed on Turner Air Force Base in the Fall of 1962. These family housing units, which are owned and administered by the plaintiff, have been constructed so that servicemen who are stationed at either the Marine Corps Supply Center or Turner Air Force Base may live together with their families. These housing units have been built under the provisions of Title VIII of the National Housing Act, as amended on August 11, 1955, (Capehart Act, 42 U.S.C. 1594; 12 U.S.C. 1748 et seq.) and from funds appropriated by Congress for the Department of Defense.

11. The defendants maintain and operate 27 public schools in Dougherty County for the education of children who reside in the County, including dependents of members and civilian employees of the plaintiff's Armed Services. These schools are Albany and Monroe High Schools, Albany, East Dougherty, McIntosh and Carver Junior High Schools, Broad Avenue, Highland Avenue, Isabella Heights, Magnolia Street, Mamie Brosnan, Morningside, Mulberry Avenue, Northside, Palmyra Heights, Radium Springs, Sherwood Acres, Sylvandale, Sylvester Road, Turner, Coachman Park, Hazard Training, Jackson Heights, Lincoln Heights, Madison Street, River Road and Tift Elementary Schools.

12. Under the provisions of Chapter 19, Title 20 of the United States Code, the United States Commissioner of Education has approved, and the plaintiff has paid, or agreed to pay, grants in the total amount of \$2,931,040.07 during the period from 1950 to the present time, for the construction and improvement of the schools described in the preceding paragraph. A tabulation of the funds paid by the plaintiff to the defendants on individual construction projects appears as Appendix A to this complaint.

13. Under the provisions of Chapter 13 of Title 20 of the United States Code, the Commissioner of Education has approved, and the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board during the period from 1951 to the present time, a total of \$2,529,535 for maintenance and operation of the schools referred to in paragraph 11. These

grants were approved and the payments made on account of the defendant Board providing public education for the dependents of members and civilian employees of the plaintiff's Armed Services, and the proceeds were used by the defendant Board to defray the general costs of the maintenance and operation of the public schools under its jurisdiction. A tabulation of the grants paid and the number of service-connected dependents on whose account they were paid for each year since 1951 is set forth as Appendix B to this complaint.

14. Turner Elementary School is located at 2000 Leonard Avenue, in Albany, in the vicinity of Turner Air Force Base. It has a planned capacity of 582 students. It consists of 12 classrooms, a multi-purpose room with stage and kitchen, library, clinic, office, toilets and boiler room and was completed on March 5, 1953, at a total cost of \$244,134.52. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$227,498.12 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commission of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. On December 20, 1955, an addition to Turner Elementary School, consisting of six classrooms, library with work room, boiler room, auxiliary rooms and septic tank and field, was completed at a total cost of \$89,396.87. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20,

United States Code. On February 23, 1962, a further addition to Turner Elementary School consisting of eight classrooms, toilet facilities, corridor, equipment, utilities, site improvements and appurtenances, was completed at a total cost of \$87,457.49. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this further addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

15. Sylvandale Elementary School is located on Cordell Lane, Albany, near Turner Air Force Base. It has a planned capacity of 700 students. Its construction, consisting of 12 classrooms, library with work and conference room, office suite, clinic, teachers' room, cafeteria with stage, kitchen, boiler room, auxiliary facilities, septic tank and field, driveway and parking areas and equipment, was completed on October 20, 1956, at a total cost of \$234,602.67. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$231,645.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19, Title 20, United States Code. On April 10, 1959, an addition to Sylvandale Elementary School, consisting of six regular classrooms, connecting corridor and auxiliary facilities, was constructed at a total cost of \$78,689.10. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$77,400.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved

by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

16. Highland Elementary School is located at 1001 Highland Avenue, Albany. It has a capacity of 600 students. On December 4, 1953, an addition, consisting of seven classrooms, boiler and storage rooms, toilets, corridors and covered walkway was constructed, and an existing assembling room, kitchen and entrance porch were remodeled, at a total cost of \$86,844.46. Of this total cost of construction and remodeling, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$84,488.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

17. River Road Elementary School is located at 1200 River Road, Albany. It has a capacity of 980 students. It consists of 22 classrooms (including one large room for multi-uses), combination lunch and assembly room with stage, kitchen, library, principal's office, clinic, teachers' lounge, necessary storage, heater room and toilets, and was completed on September 3, 1954, at a total cost of \$335,080.71. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$319,980.43 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. An addition, consisting of

eight classrooms, storage room, mechanical equipment room, toilets, corridors and auxiliary facilities, was completed on May 22, 1962, at a total cost of \$73,109.26. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$64,084.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

18. Magnolia Elementary School is located at 1800 Sanford Drive, Albany. It has a capacity of 900 students. Its construction, consisting of eight classrooms, four self-contained classrooms, library, assembly-cafeteria with kitchen and stage, office suite, clinic, teachers' room, boiler room and auxiliary rooms, was completed on August 19, 1955, at a total cost of \$225,720.11. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$225,000.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. An addition to Magnolia Elementary School, consisting of eight classrooms, teachers' lounge, auxiliary facilities, storage, covered passage and equipment, was completed on January 3, 1958, at a total cost of \$93,037.82. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the

defendant Board \$92,800.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. A further addition to Magnolia Elementary School, consisting of eight classrooms, storage and mechanical rooms, toilet facilities, equipment, utilities, appurtenances and site improvements, was completed on January 15, 1962, at a total cost of \$71,818.12. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

19. Northside Elementary School is located at 14th Street and North Harding, Albany. It has a capacity of 700 students. An addition, consisting of six classrooms, teachers' room, auxiliary facilities and equipment, was completed on August 1, 1956, at a total cost of \$72,200.05. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

20. Carver Junior High School is located at 400 South Monroe Street, Albany. It has a capacity of 1,100 students. An addition, consisting of six classrooms, auxiliary facilities and equipment, was constructed on January 23, 1957, at a total cost

of \$48,975.32. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$48,954.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

21. Morningside Elementary School is located on Sunset Boulevard, Albany. It has a capacity of 650 students. Its construction, consisting of 20 regular classrooms, library with work room, cafetorium with stage, kitchen with service areas, administrative suite including teachers' lounge and clinic, mechanical equipment room, auxiliary facilities, bus-loading platform, site work and necessary equipment, was completed on February 24, 1958, at a total cost of \$305,433.58. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this construction under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

22. Jackson Heights Elementary School is located at 1305 East Second and Carroll Streets, in Dougherty County, just outside the city limits of Albany. It has a capacity of 800 students. An addition, consisting of three classrooms and corridor, was completed on April 24, 1958, at a total cost of \$27,084.06. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$21,166.00 under a grant applied for by the Board

and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. A further addition, consisting of three classrooms, teachers' lounge, auxiliary facilities and site work, was completed on April 24, 1959, at a total cost of \$41,086.66. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$33,300.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. A yet further addition, consisting of six regular classrooms, storage and mechanical rooms, toilet facilities, equipment, septic tank with fields, utilities, site improvements and appurtenances, was completed on January 3, 1962, at a total cost of \$60,007.52. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this further addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

23. Sherwood Acres Elementary School is located at 2100 Barnsdale Way, Albany. It has a capacity of 700 students. An addition, consisting of eight classrooms, auxiliary facilities and equipment, was constructed on September 2, 1960, at a total cost of \$67,457.99. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

24. Sylvester Road Elementary School is located at 2600 Sylvester Road, in Dougherty County, just outside the city limits of Albany. It has a capacity of 500 students. Its construction, consisting of nine classrooms, book storage room, library with work room, administrative suite with clinic, teachers' lounge, boys' and girls' toilet rooms, equipment rooms, storage room, cafetorium with stage, kitchen with service areas, auxiliary facilities, equipment, septic tank and field, was completed on March 22, 1961, at a total cost of \$213,006.33. Of this total cost of construction, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$210,112.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. An addition, consisting of eleven classrooms, toilet facilities, corridor, equipment, utilities, site improvements and appurtenances, was constructed on January 15, 1962, at a total cost of \$86,334.18. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

25. Lincoln Heights Elementary School is located at 700 Corn Avenue, Albany. It has a capacity of 1,295 students. An addition, consisting of six regular classrooms, boys' and girls' toilets and auxiliary facilities, was completed on

October 10, 1960, at a total cost of \$51,478.29. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

26. East Dougherty Junior High School is located at 1800 Massey Drive, Albany, near Turner Air Force Base and the Marine Corps Supply Center. It has a capacity of 1,400 students. An addition, consisting of 13 classrooms, corridor, toilet facilities, equipment, utilities, site improvements and appurtenances, was completed on January 23, 1962, at a total cost of \$118,279.43. The plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board the total cost of this addition under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code.

27. Radium Springs Elementary School is located on Roxanna Road, in Dougherty County, just outside the city limits of Albany. It has a capacity of 400 students. Its construction, consisting of 13 classrooms, library and reading room with small conference and work room, teachers' lounge, administrative suite consisting of principal's office, general office and clinic, covered walk entrance, corridors, mechanical room, cafetorium with stage, kitchen with service areas, toilet facilities, book storage and general storage, equipment, septic

tank and fields, utilities, site improvements and appurtenances, is currently underway. The estimated total cost of this construction is \$295,803.00, of which the plaintiff has agreed to pay to the defendant Board \$284,749.00 under a grant applied for by the Board and approved by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code. To date, the plaintiff has paid to the defendant Board \$256,274.00 of this sum.

28. In connection with each of its applications for a grant under Chapter 19 of Title 20, United States Code, as referred to in paragraph 12 and paragraphs 14 through 27, the defendant Board gave written assurance, as required by 20 U.S.C. 636, that the school facilities of the Board "will be available to the children for whose education contributions are provided . . . on the same terms, in accordance with the laws of the State in which applicant is situated, as they are available to other children in applicant's school district."

29. The members and civilian employees of the Armed Services of the plaintiff stationed or employed at the Marine Corps Supply Center and Turner Air Force Base include persons of both the white and Negro races. The school age dependents of such members and employees include children of both the white and Negro races.

30. It is the policy and practice of the defendants, in operating the public schools of Dougherty County, to segregate Negro students in separate schools maintained and operated solely for students who are of the Negro race.

31. The defendants have operated and are presently operating Albany High School, Albany, East Dougherty and McIntosh Junior High Schools, Broad Avenue, Highland Avenue, Isabella Heights, Magnolia Street, Mamie Brosnan, Morningside, Mulberry Avenue, Northside, Palmyra Heights, Radium Springs, Sherwood Acres, Sylvandale, Sylvester Road and Turner Elementary Schools for the education of children of the white race exclusively. The defendants have operated and are presently operating Monroe High School, Carver Junior High School and Hazard Training, Coachman Park, Jackson Heights, Lincoln Heights, Madison Street, River Road and Tift Elementary Schools for the education of children of the Negro race exclusively.

32. By reason of the policy and practice of the defendants to assign students to schools according to their race, all Negro school age dependents of the members and employees of plaintiff's Armed Services stationed or employed at the Marine Corps Supply Center and Turner Air Force Base, are compelled to attend schools operated exclusively for members of the Negro race and are not permitted to attend schools available to white children similarly situated.

33. Pursuant to the policy and practice of the defendants to assign students to schools according to their race, the defendants assign Negro school-age dependents of military personnel and civilian employees of the plaintiff residing within Dougherty County to schools further from their residences than other schools operated by the defendants for the education of white children exclusively.

34. Approximately 4,750 children of military personnel and civilians stationed or employed at the Marine Corps Supply Center and Turner Air Force Base attend the public schools operated by the defendants. Of these children, approximately 800 are Negroes.

35. Of the children referred to in the preceding paragraph, in excess of 700 are children of members of the plaintiff's Armed Services residing within Turner Air Force Base or the Marine Corps Supply Center. Of these, approximately 27 are Negroes.

36. The defendants have failed and are now failing to make the public school facilities under their jurisdiction available to Negro dependents of the members and employees of the Armed Services of the plaintiff upon the same terms as such facilities are available to white children of Dougherty County.

37. The Board has failed and is now failing and refusing to perform each of its assurances referred to in paragraph 28.

38. The acts and conduct of the defendants herein alleged violate the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution.

39. The defendants will, unless restrained by order of this Court, continue unconstitutionally to discriminate against the dependents of Negro military personnel and civilian employees of the plaintiff because of their race, thereby violating the written assurances described in paragraph 28 and causing irreparable injury to the plaintiff, consisting of impairment of the service and morale of its military and civilian personnel and the separation of servicemen from their families when Negro servicemen send their children to schools outside the area of Turner Air Force Base and the Marine Corps Supply Center in order to avoid subjecting the children to racial discrimination in the children's education.

40. The plaintiff has no adequate remedy at law.

WHEREFORE, plaintiff prays that the Court enter an order enjoining the defendants, their successors in office, agents, employees, and all persons in active concert or participation with them from segregating or discriminating against, among, or between, upon the basis of their race or color, any dependents of the members or employees of the Armed Services of the plaintiff in the operation of public

schools in Dougherty County, together with such additional relief as may be appropriate.
